

CHOONAM BRILLIANTINE'S CAREER IN ENGLAND

- His first appearance in the show ring was 11 months of age at Crufts, taking his first Challenge Certificate
- In only eight Championship shows in succession he was a sterling winner. At 7 consecutive Championship shows he was awarded the Grand Challenge Prize for Best dog in show
- The whole of his winning career in England occupied less than five months and was completed before he was sixteen months old
- Shortly before being exported from England, Choonam Brilliantine won the first recorded Ladies Kennel Association All Breed Best in Show in 1925
- Mrs. Mannooch received many offers for Brilliantine the first day he was exhibited at Crufts, but turned them down. Even higher sums were offered for his sister, Ch. Choonam Brilliantina, but her owner could not be induced to part with her.
- Finally an offer of almost \$10,0000 USD (over half a

million dollars in todays market) was accepted from Mrs. Earl Hoover of the USA. Mrs. Hoover was wife of the multimillionaire Howard Earl Hoover of Chicago, chairman of the Hoover vacuum company. Her father the president of the Chicago Board of Trade

• On July 17th, 1925 Brilliantine sailed to America on the USS Aquitania. This ship was being built when the Titanic sank



Champion Choonan Brilliantine

DOG GOING TO BALTIMORE

When the Cunard liner Aquitania was made fast at her pier yesterday at the foot of West Thirteenth Street and the gangways run out, the attention of every one, including the customs officials and longshoremen, was attracted to Champion Choonan Brilliantine, the \$10,000 chow dog, said to be the handsomest of that species ever seen in Europe or in the United States.

With a magnificent ruddy mane tinged with gold and a face like that of the benevolent-looking red lions one sees in picture books the champion chow, which has carried off all prizes in England, walked down to the pier beside Mrs. William S. Beyer of Baltimore, who said she had brought the dog over for his owner. Mrs. H. Earle Hoover of Glencoe, Ill. The dog was born at Great Missenden, Buckinghamshire, England, sixteen months ago and won his first prize when he was three months old, Mrs. Beyer said. The duty paid on the dog was \$1,400. After being inspected by the customs officials and admired by the crowd the famous chow was stowed away in a big square box like a miniature seashore bungalow and shipped away in charge of an attendant.

There were several other prize dogs on the liner, including three fine St. Bernards brought direct from the monastery on Mount St. Bernard, Switzerland, by D. H. Lawrence. One of the dogs was Meggi II, which has won several prizes, the owner said. There were other pedigree chows, spaniels and the usual number of police dogs.

Chicago Canine Chowledes Chicago Canine Show Displays U. S. Champions

CHICAGO, III., March 26.—Some of the finest blue-blooded canines in America will be displayed as star dogs of the East compete for honors with the best in Chicago and the middlewest at the 27th annual show of the Chicago Kennel Club, March 30.

A bitter "dog fight" is forecast in the chow chow entries. Mrs. H. Earl Hoover of Glencoe, Ill., owner of some of the most perfect chows in the world, will send here choice dogs against those of Eugene Byfield of Barrington, Ill. Among the Hoover entries will be Choonan Brilliantine of Manchoover, valued at \$10,000 and winner of the award for best of all dogs, regardless of breed, at last year's Chicago show.

Pogo of Kang Shi, a champion chow, will be among the chief entries from the Byfield kennels.

FAMOUS HOOVER CHOW TRIUMPHS

Defeats MacMonnies' Sensational Puppy, Maxown Model, for Best.

One of the first collections of chows that has ever been brought together assembled in the roof garden getner assembled in the Waldorf-Astoria last night for the annual specialty show of the Chow Chow Club. They ranged in color from the "flossy" cream. through powder blue, and golden red to abysmal black, and they all-or most of them-looked like a million

through powder blue, and golden red to abysmal black, and they all—or most of them—looked like a million dollars.

But had not another specimen been at the exhibit, the sheer beauty of one of them would have been enough to put the show on the map. It seems hardly necessary to say that the canine in question is Ch. Choonam Brilliantine, whose owner. Mrs. If. Earl Hoover, startled the world last year by parting with a keen silied of coin of the realm to snatch away from England this famous winner. And, strange as it may seem. Brilliantine has not proved a flop.

In fact, the only real defeat of Brilliantine has not proved a flop.

In fact, the only real defeat of Brilliantine that comes readily to mind was at the Sesqui show of the American Kennel Club, when the handsome dog was put on the back of the shelf by Mr. McElwyn of CarMar, owned by C. E. Libbey of New Haven. But it is doubtful if Mr. McElvyn could have repeated his triumph yesterday had he been entered. Brilliantine went to best of winners, and then best of breed over the sensational puppy bitch. Maxown Model, owned by Wallace MacMonnies, a mative Long Islander who now parks his hat in Madison, N. J. Medel, shown in peor coat, but having indisputable qualities, especially in the head and carriage of the sears, went directly from the novice class to winners in bitches. She deteated two exceptionally fine females in this semi-final event. The first of these was Dr. William S. Baer's red American-bred entrant, Moosilnako Pao M'Sia, who took reserve, and the other was Mrs. Hoover's Ch. Bue Fi Fi of Manchoover, who looks like a big blue feather boa. Both of these were displayed in wonderful cont.

Brilliantine walked away with hat prizes by such a wide margin that

Brilliantine walked away with his prizes by such a wide margin that there was never any question of his superiority. He was miles ahead of the others, even including the 9-month-old puppy, Model, that took reserve. Even the exceptionariy good entry of Mrs. David Wagstaff, which went to reserve winners in dogs, Ledgelands' Solo Chink, could not compare with the dog from the Manchoover Kennels of Glencoe, Ill.

There were no fewer than 60 intries at this show, but they were gathered from practically all sections of the country, thus giving the exhibition a truly national character. The judging was done by Mrs. Adnah Neyhart from Framingham Center, Mass., and in most cases her awards gave satisfaction to every one.


