\$9,500 CHOW WINS HONORS AT TUXEDO

Mrs. H. Earl Hoover's Imported Choosam Brilliantine Declared Best of Class.

Oh you have NO idea how excited I am!!! Recently I decided to add a new page to the archives with photos and names of all the USA Chow National winners. In my research I have found a number of missing or incorrect entries on the master list I was using on the CCCI website so I set out to see how accurately I could update it.

Little did I know the monumental task that was ahead of me. To make a VERY long (and continuing) story short, today I discovered the missing entry for 1925.

TUXEDO, N. Y., Sept. 26.—A very haughty chow dog bearing the name of Choosam Brilliantine drew the attention of practically every one of the 3,000 persons who attended the annual Tuxedo Kennel Club's dog show on the lawn of the old Tuxedo Club here this afternoon, and when Choosam Brilliantine was declared to be the best of breed over a field comprising about eighty other chows there was not a dissenting voice.

Choosam Brilliantine is an imported dog, having fetched the reported record price of \$9,500 when brought here recently by Mrs. H. Earl Hoover, who exhibited him today. The chow lived up to his name. He was brilliant in every move and when he wasn't the centre of all eyes in the show ring he was the centre of a big crowd at his kennel. While there were 650 dogs of various Choosam Brilliantine, breeds shown. born abroad on March 15, 1924, and being shown in this country for the first time, overshadowed all the others.

Mrs. David Wagstaff, President of the Tuxedo Kennel Club, exhibited her Ledgeland's Winnie of Pien H' Sie in the chow class and was rewarded by capturing the best of breed for the opposite sex. There was no best of show, the awards being made for best of breed

and winners' dogs in each class.

Mrs. William L. Fitzgereald judged the chows, while the judges in the other classes included Tyler Morse, Mrs. Harry L. Sears, Mrs. M. W. McLaughlin, Theodore Crane, Henry T. Fleitman, John F. Collins, George W. Owens and P. A. B. Widener.

"Tomorrow there is the annual Tuxedo Kennel Club show---a notable event in itself, which, however, assumes unusual importance because of the fact that the **Fifth annual Chow Chow Club's show** is into be held in

conjunction with it this year."

Mrs David Wagstaff, who is rapidly becoming recognized as one of society's leaders, is president of both associations and has done much to further the success of this affair.

There re three hundred entries, and seventy five exhibitors listed, which exceed considerably the number of any other previous show. Mrs.
