
I'm not certain if the dog in the photo above is the same as book article below, as the photo is dated 1920 and the article below shows 1912. I have a feeling these are 2 different chows that Alice Nielsen owned.

#### 1912: BIG TIME POPULARITY

"If a line of airships crossing the ocean is ever established it will certainly get my business," Alice Nielsen told Boston Globe (Se 21). During the passage she was seasick, seldom left her stateroom. Nielsen "greatly regretted that she would not be with the Boston Opera Company this season, for her home is here and she dearly loves Bostonians," said Globe. Gifts were waiting, she carried "a Chinese chow dog for her brother." She was "much disappointed that the weather conditions prevented the steamer from making port here a day earlier."

Nielsen had enjoyed her first air flight, and wanted more. Speaking later that day to Boston Traveler, "I shall be a passenger in the first transatlantic aeroplane. I've got tired of traveling in ships. I never did like them, and if the birdmen will give us an opportunity to cross the ocean with them, I'll try to help along the enterprise by promptly booking passage with them."

Traveler told more about the puppy than Globe. "Miss Nielsen bought her brother, who lives here, a seven-weeks-old Chinese dog she has christened Chow. The dog is a lively, good-sized creature, with a handsome face and straight, seal-brown hair." Apparently Alice kept Chow; or liked the name, she was photographed for Boston papers in the 1920s with the dog.



### ALICE NIELSEN BIOGRAPHY

Alice Nielsen, (born June 7, 1868?, Nashville, Tenn., U.S.—died March 8, 1943, New York, N.Y.), American lyric soprano whose successful career in light opera was followed by a second one in grand opera.

Nielsen's first opera experience was in a touring production in 1886 of The Mikado by W.S. Gilbert and Arthur Sullivan. In 1896 Nielsen won a position with the Bostonians, a leading light opera company, and eventually won the female lead in Reginald De Koven's Robin Hood. In 1897 she formed the Alice Nielsen Comic Opera Company. Her greatest successes with her own company were Victor Herbert's The Fortune Teller (1898) and The Singing Girl (1899), both written for her.

From 1901 to 1903 Nielsen studied in Rome; she began singing lead roles in operas by composers such as Gioachino Rossini and Giuseppe Verdi. In 1909, after two successful tours of the United States, Nielsen joined the Boston Opera Company, with which she remained for five years. She continued to sing professionally until 1923
