IT is our singularly good fortune to be able to present as the centrepiece of this page a photograph which, both in its human and in its canine subject, is a centrepiece of international interest. Just twenty-three years ago that photograph was taken—the photograph of the fine sportsman who was destined to give us the most remarkable strain of Chows which the fancy has ever known; the photograph of the puppy whose progeny were to shape the destiny of Chowdom in two hemispheres. Born on June 26, 1903, Red Judy was Mr. Scriven's first Chow; her sire was Red Craze, which was by Ch. Shylock, and her dam, Ang Kow, was also a child of the latter celebrity. Red Judy became the dam of Carissa, which went to America to be largely the founder of the Chow cult there, and whose name figures in most of the winning pedigrees on both sides of the Atlantic. For the most part the "Mulfras" of to-day are direct descendants of Red Judy, and one can see from this centre photograph where the "Mulfra" merit begam—at the very beginning; look at that wonderful Chowy expression, that breadth of skull, that massively fashioned head and jaw, those small eyes and tiny tilted ears, that perfection of coat, body, and build; that leonine type and character. Look at that puppy and you see the golden key that opened the golden future of the "Mulfra" stud.

"The one prudence in life," says Emerson, "is concentration," and it is Mr. Scriven's constant and purposeful concentration, and ability governed by an indomitable aim, which have made the "Mulfra" kennel what it is, and enabled its members for over two decades to carry their banners unwaveringly wherever canines compete.

And what of to-day? To-day is greater than even all the great yesterdays; bewilderingly greater, for no other kennel has such a number of exhibition Chows. Mr. Scriven seems to have got rid of the impedimenta of even minor faults. There is, for instance, such an old favourite as CH. Mulfra Bustry, the famous red daughter of Cathay, and which, though just in her prime—she is seven years old,—is kept out of the ring to make way there for younger stock. There is CH. Mulfra Myrriz, by Ch. Lemming and only three years old this month; there is her mother, Mulfra

Mulfra Marguerre, not yet shown as an adult, had lots of wins as a puppy, while Mulfra Electra, litter sister to Ning Ning, won at the Kensington Canine Society's Show, on her only outing. Her daughter, Mulfra Lotte, by Ch. Ragavarno, was 1st Puppy and 1st Junior at Windsor in 1924, and Mulfra Lucy was best Puppy at Leeds last year.
