Another of this splendidly coloured litter is MULFRA NINIA, who won reserve championship to her sister at Birmingham this year. She is already a proved breeder, having recently produced her second litter, five red puppies by Hildewell Ba Tang. Yet another of the same glorious hue is MULFRA GWENNIE, by Red Sinbad ex Cathay. She is evidence again of the wonderful reproductive abilities of the bitches as well as of the dogs in Mr. Scriven's stud. She will raise many a flag, to use a coursing term, for this famous kennel. These, then, are a few of the Chows in a stud that is one of the dominating forces in the breed, and whose representatives turn the vision of the idealist into the reality.

ALTHOUGH not a frequent exhibitor, Mrs. Crosbie has had a long and intimate acquaintance with the Celestial dog, and has bred many good winners. Red Ching is undoubtedly one of the best she has owned, as he is also one of the best of this variety in Scotland. Unfortunately, the photograph does not do his many points full justice. He has a grand head, with short, square muzzle, well-placed eyes, and neat, well-carried ears, very sound front, with a short, strong body and excellent hindquarters. He is particularly good in colour, with a coat of perfect texture. Only shown twice, at the S.K.C., Edinburgh, in 1922 and 1923, he has won first and three thirds in big classes. His breeding is of the best, being by Chow Ching Yot, by Mr. Boomerley ex Leisha by Wyndam's Beauty. With his excellent parentage and undeniable merit, his services at stud should be in great demand.
