**T**HIS year the representative chosen for illustration on this page is the noted YELDNIL MAY SAW, which, as can be seen from his photograph, is a superb specimen of the breed. He has a short thick muzzle, deep set dark eyes, BEAUTIFUL SMALL TULIP SHAPED EARS correctly placed and carried; BALANCED and cobby; he has an exceptional brisket, broad chest, perfect legs, grand bone, short back, straight wonderful hocks, and Chow action so sadly lacking in the majority of present-day Chows. His stand-off coat, of the deepest of red, is profuse and harsh. Yeldnil May Saw has always been in the money at open and championship shows, and is an acknowledged stud force, not a single bitch having failed to him, although some of them were presumed barren. Some of his puppies will be heard of in the near future. As he transmits his beautiful hocks, action, and colour to eighty per cent. of his progeny, he is an ideal stud dog, and at three years old is just in his prime.

Thoughtful breeders will consider very seriously the claims of Yeldnil May Saw as a stud force, as he is royally bred. Mr. Pringle's first love was a Chow, and so it will be to the end.
